1962		In response to growing public concern about the lack of vocational/technical training opportunities in the area, the impact of technology and automation in the workplace, the inability of comprehensive high schools to meet technical/vocational training needs, and the rising entrance standards in institutions of higher education, the Kalamazoo Public Schools administration issues a report on the potential for creating a community college in Kalamazoo
1962		Every county adjacent to Kalamazoo County is involved in investigating, planning for, or opening a community college
1964	Fall	The Kalamazoo PTA Council organizes a Citizens Committee to objectively assess the educational needs of the community; after forming the Committee, the PTA Council relinquishes control, and the Committee becomes an autonomous body responsible to the citizenry of Kalamazoo County; committee of 25 is chaired by Marvin De Boer
1964	Fall	The Kalamazoo Community Foundation grants "up to four thousand dollars" to support the work of the Citizens Committee
1965		The Kalamazoo County Superintendents' Association completes a "Survey of Vocational Education and Practical Arts Facilities and Programs in Kalamazoo County;" the report recommends serious consideration of some type of county- wide post high school program that would include programs for low competency students

1966	March 9	"Report of the Citizens Committee to Study Educational and Job Needs in Kalamazoo County" (also referred to as the Job Needs Study) is completed
1966	Мау	"Report of the Feasibility of a Community College for the Kalamazoo Valley Intermediate School District" (also referred to as the Feasibility Study) is completed by the Citizens Committee with technical support from the Division of Field Services, Western Michigan University; report recommends the creation of a "Kalamazoo Community College"
1966	August 1	A community college for the Kalamazoo Valley Intermediate School District is established as a legal entity by vote of the citizens of 9 school districts: City of Kalamazoo Public Schools, Climax-Scotts Community Schools, Comstock Public Schools, Galesburg-Augusta Public Schools, Gull Lake Community Schools, Parchment Public Schools, Portage Public Schools, Schoolcraft Community Schools, Vicksburg Community Schools; in the same election, a special 1.5 mill tax levy is passed to support the College, and 6 Trustees are elected: Daniel J. Heathcote, Paul D. Jackson, Mable A. Shoemaker, John R. Barth, Robert J. Wollam, Dominic B. Leonardelli
1966	October 27	Board of Trustees adopts 9 objectives for the College (no record of the objectives found)
1967		Community College's first office opens at 1924 White's Road in Kalamazoo
1967	January	Site and demographic study completed
1967	March 7	Alden B. Dow Associates of Midland, Michigan, retained as College architects
1967	March 8	<i>Kalamazoo Gazette</i> article announcing the selection of the College architects is the earliest known (as of 3/30/2012) print reference to the full name "Kalamazoo Valley Community College"
1967	March 15	Dale B. Lake appointed the College's founding president
1967	May 8	Board of Trustees and President Dale Lake make a final walking inspection of the proposed building site
1967	May 9	Board of Trustees finalizes the selection of a 185-acre parcel as the future site of Kalamazoo Valley Community College; sellers George and Florence Sprau, who previously raised 80 acres of popcorn on the property, limit the sale to "a public or similar non-profit eleemosynary institution;" purchase price is \$296,000, or \$1,600 per acre
1967		Early architectural drawings depict the College on the shores of a "proposed lake," south of the campus; Kalamazoo County's Al Sabo Land Preserve, including the west branch of Portage Creek, abuts the College property

1967	June 7	"Kalamazoo Valley Community College: Educational Specifications, the Permanent Campus" report lists 9 two-year general studies programs, 66 occupational programs, and apprenticeship programs "as needed" to be introduced in the first 4 years of operation; examples of projected offerings include Legal Secretarial, Chemical Technology, Professional Typist, Materials Testing, Dental Hygienist, Conservation Technology, Welder, and Household Appliance Repair; noting west Michigan's severe winter weather, the report recommends the eventual development of "one or two massive buildings" rather than multiple smaller buildings
1967	July	Bruce Kocher hired as Dean of Students, the College's second employee; Robert Chick hired as Dean of Administration, the College's third employee
1967	July 11	Board of Trustees policy states that authorized College travel will normally be made by College-owned vehicle or public carrier; if College vehicle is unavailable, personal vehicle mileage will be reimbursed at 10 cents per mile; if College vehicle is available but not used, personal vehicle mileage will be reimbursed at 3 cents per mile
1967	July	Plans are approved for construction of an "instant campus" modular building
1967	August	Three-phase long-range construction program adopted
1967	August	The Exchange Club of Suburban Kalamazoo presents a check for \$300, the College's first scholarship funds, to President Dale Lake
1967	December 21	Opening of construction bids for a pre-engineered (modular) building reveals bids ranging from \$740,000 to over \$1- million, much higher than the expected \$600,000; low bid is from Speed Space of Santa Rosa, California
1968		First master plan completed
1968	January 9	Trustees unanimously accept a final construction bid of approximately \$650,000 for the campus's first building; talks between the College's architectural firm, Alden B. Dow Associates, and building fabricator Speed Space resulted in modifications that lowered the bid from the original \$740,000 submission; final cost for the 48,000 square foot building will be approximately \$13.50 per square foot
1968	January 10	Kalamazoo Gazette announces College's official opening is planned for Fall Semester
1968	January	First 100 students accepted and formed into a Student Planning Task Force (alternate source cites 110 students)
1968	January	College adopts a "split semester" format with a "College Approved Program" (CAP) element; each semester will include a 13-week segment and a separate 3-week CAP segment allowing for innovative educational experiences; students may take one CAP course per semester; CAP courses meet 3 hours daily for 3 weeks and grant a full semester's credit for the course

1968	February	KV/CC is acconted as a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges
1908	February	KVCC is accepted as a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges
1968	February 13	Board of Trustees approves 14 staff appointments with a starting date of September 1; 5 more faculty members are also hired, with 10 faculty still to be finalized
1968	February 13	President Dale Lake announces 3,000 volumes have been acquired or ordered for the library; 5,000 additional volumes are planned
1968	February 20	President Dale Lake writes to the District Engineer for the State Highway Department requesting highway signage to indicate KVCC's location; a reply from the Highway Department's Lansing office explains that signs are provided only for 4-year institutions accredited by the North Central Association of College and Secondary Schools and implies that KVCC is seeking free advertising
1968	April 1	Groundbreaking for the College's first building, Redwood Hall
1968	August	College's first building, a 40,000-square-foot modular structure, is completed in 90 days and named Redwood Hall
1968	August	47-member "Pioneer Faculty" report and participate in two weeks of seminars and workshops
1968	September 10	For the first time a faculty meeting is held onsite at the College
1968	September 15	2,500 people attend the opening ceremony, ribbon-cutting, and campus dedication at Redwood Hall
1968	September 16	First classes begin with 1,518 students enrolled: 887 full-time and 631 part-time, 998 males and 520 females, 514 with previous college experience and 1,004 without, 789 (578 males and 211 females) in vocational-technical programs and 729 (420 males and 309 females) in transfer programs, 1,243 District residents, 266 non-district Michiganders, and 9 out-of-state residents; initial tuition is set at \$10 per credit hour
1968	September	Initial public bus service to the campus makes just 2 stops, at 11:10 a.m. and 5:10 p.m.
1968	September 25-26	Students vote to select Blue and White school colors and the Cougars mascot
1968		4 men's sports are instituted: basketball, baseball, golf, and soccer; for the 1st 2 years, the College has no gymnasium, so the basketball team practices at other locations
1968	October 11	First issue of the first student newspaper, Valley Voice, is issued
1968	October 16	Students vote to ratify the Student Congress Constitution proposed by the Student Advisory Committee
1968	November	Students vote for first Student Congress officers

1968	November	Faculty Senate has been formed, and standing committees have all have met; committees include Academic Affairs chaired by Maureen Taylor, Academic Standards chaired by Paul Millikan, Professional Affairs chaired by Jim Hemenway, and Student Affairs chaired by Shirley Averill
1968	November	Approximately 12 student groups are meeting and preparing to apply for official College club status
1968	November	Cafeteria menu posted by Canteen Services offers Hamburg, Bar B Que, Chili Dog, or Fish Sandwich for 35 cents; other offerings include Cheeseburg, Hot Dog, French Fries, Onion Rings, and Soup
1968	November 23	KVCC celebrates its first and last Non-Homecoming and crowns a Non-Homecoming Queen and Court at the Non- Homecoming Dance; (no homecoming game to celebrate)
1968	November 25	The KVCC theater group 9th Street Players presents their first performance, one-act plays titled "Impromptu" and "Sorry, Wrong Number"
1968	November 26	Cougars basketball team scores their 1st victory in the 3rd game of their 1st season, defeating Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music
1969		Long-range facilities development plan submitted by architects Alden B. Dow Associates of Midland, Michigan
1969	Winter Semester	To free up time for meetings and special events, no classes are scheduled on Wednesdays between 3:30 and 6:00
1969	March 17	<i>Faculty Focus</i> newsletter announces 3 competitionsfor faculty, for staff, and for community membersto design a College logo; entries should include the name of the College, 1968 as the date of organization, and "some form of symbolism;" the resulting original seal features the Tower and includes the College's 1966 creation date rather than 1968, when the first classes were held
1969	March 19	First weekly 90-minute scheduled "Talk In" time is held; students are invited to stop in the conference room for informal conversation with the College President, student officers, Dean of Students, other administrators, and occasionally a member of the Board of Trustees
1969	March	President Dale Lake designates a 90-minute period each week as "Drop-in Time;" faculty are invited to drop in and discuss "anything at all," no appointment needed; meeting by appointment is also encouraged
1969	March	Student Congress purchases a mimeograph machine for the use of student clubs and organizations; groups should supply their own stencils
1969	March	Second phase of the construction program begins: the main building
1969	April 1	Dress rehearsal for two KVCC plays, "Here We Are" by Dorothy Parker and "The Ugly Duckling" by A. A. Milne, performed for a "faculty wives get-together"

1969	April 15	Students stage a "Demonstration of Appreciation" (also called a "Reverse Protest"), thanking the Board of Trustees, administration, and facultyin contrast to demonstrations of campus unrest occurring across the country; demonstration signs include "KVCC the Cool School," "Trust the Trustees," "Thank You for a Fine First Year," and others; event is noted in the Congressional Record of May 29, 1969
1969	April 26	College's first Spring Formal, called "R'eves D'Amour" (sic), is held at Hillside Junior High School
1969	June 2	First faculty and staff family picnic held in Milham Park; all employees, Trustees, and families are invited
1969	Summer	With no summer courses offered by the College, history instructor Paul Millikan coordinates with the Kalamazoo Public Museum to offer an Archaeology fieldwork experience for 15 students: KVCC's first summer program; the team excavates an historic cabin site, and the resulting artifacts are placed in the Museum's collection
1969	June 16	Start of official summer office hours for secretarial staff: 8:00 a.m 4:30 p.m. with one-half hour for lunch
1969	August	9,600-square-foot Butler Building, nicknamed "The Tin Hut," is erected northeast of Redwood Hall; structure houses an automotive technology laboratory, bookstore, student publications area, student meeting area, and a student center with a juke box, vending machines, and pool table
1969	August 6	North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools accepts KVCC's Status Study report and authorizes a "diagnostic examination" visit, the next step toward accreditation
1969	Fall Semester	Bus service to the campus is expanded to 4 stops a day; if bus service is not used, it will be discontinued after 30 days
1969	Fall Semester	Library changes its name to Learning Resources Center (LRC) to reflect growing collections in diverse media formats; LRC changes from Dewey Decimal to Library of Congress cataloging system
1969	September	Second academic year opens with 2,573 students
1969	September 15	Biweekly student newspaper <i>The Communicator</i> publishes first issue; paper is published by students in Journalism 125 class and interested volunteers
1969	September 15	Student newspaper <i>The Communicator</i> reports that all 5 divisions of the College added instructors for Fall Semester for a total of 22 new faculty, 18 of whom are full-time; divisions include Business Division, Engineering Sciences and Technology Division, Division of Health Sciences and Technology, Humanities Division, Social Sciences Division
1969	October	Mattawan School District annexed to KVCC District by vote of Mattawan electorate
1969	October 27	The 1969 Pontiac assigned for faculty use is replaced by a 1970 LeMans; the new car will have dealer plates but can be driven in any state for any authorized College travel

1969	December 11	4-page art and literary supplement to student newspaper <i>The Communicator</i> is titled "First Annual Hippie Gazette & Reefer Sheet"
1969	December	Plans for Fall Semester in the new buildingstill under constructioninclude 120-seat classrooms with computerized systems with which students will respond to multiple-choice questions from their instructors
1970		By 1970, KVCC offers 8 men's sports; no women's sports are yet offered
1970	February 14	The Faculty Wives Club Valentine dinner dance is cancelled; in lieu of the dinner dance, a get together at Shakey's will follow the Homecoming basketball game
1970	March	College becomes a Recognized Candidate for Accreditation by action of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools
1970	April?	Builders erect the College's iconic Tower above the main entrance to the new building
1970	April	Student newspaper Brouhaha receives awards for articles and photography at state competition
1970	June	KVCC's first graduation exercises award 132 associate's degrees and 6 certificates (alternate source reports 178 graduates); Governor William G. Milliken delivers the commencement address
1970	June	Tuition per semester credit hour is \$10 for district residents, \$20 for Michigan out-of-district residents, and \$30 for non-residents; no laboratory or student activity fees are assessed
1970	August 8	Cornerstone laying ceremony for second-phase construction project, the new main campus building
1970	Fall	Smoking is restricted to general office areas, faculty office areas, food services areas, and rest rooms in both "the 1968 Facility [Redwood Hall] and the new building"
1970	Fall Semester	KVCC offers Dental Hygiene program for the first time
1970	Fall Semester	Business English class is now divided into two sections dictated by students' vocational plans: "One will appeal to men in the field of business communication, and the other will specialize in clerical work for secretaries"
1970	September 1	Per the 1970-71 faculty "Senate Agreement," a Professional Development Plan approved by the President or his designee is required of each faculty member; Plans should include 15 hours of graduate work or the equivalent, to be completed in no longer than 3 years
1970	September	Third academic year opens with 2,996 students
1970	October	A student is elected by the Academic Affairs Committee to serve as chairman of this joint student-faculty committee
1970	Fall	Parts of the new building are finished; students and faculty move into the partially-completed complex

1970	December 7-9	Grand opening of The Cougar Collection (bookstore) in the new main building
1971	March	New main campus building opens with 260,500 square feet of classrooms, labs, cafeteria, library, auditorium, gym, and pool, plus track and athletic fields
1971	March 12	Board of Trustees recognizes the "Faculty Association" union name adopted by the Faculty Senate; bargaining unit will include counselors except the Director of Counseling and librarians except the Director of Library Services
1971	April	External newsletter, Tower Talks, initiated and published "occasionally," then 4 times per year, then 3 times per year
1971	May 16	Campus dedication and open house for the "new \$8M educational facility," the 260,500-square-foot main building; over 2,500 attend the dedication
1971	May	College staff produce first 16mm film, a documentary about KVCC titled "A Place to Begin"
1971	Мау	College's first self-study report submitted to the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools
1971	June	Second annual Commencement awards 141 associate's degrees and 5 certificates

A special classroom requested and designed by philosophy instructor and pioneer faculty member Bob Badra is created within the new building; known as the "Love Room" or the "Pillow Room," the room offers only pillow and floor seating and features multi-color lighting to create a relaxed and informal setting for philosophy, meditation, "The Study of Love," and similar classes; as of 2013, the room is still in use, pillows and all
1971	Summer	Child care is offered for the first time; 65 children ages 3 and up are enrolled
1971	Summer	"Student Labor Force" program helps students find temporary jobs including lawn care, babysitting, painting, typing, factory help, clerical work, window washing, and farm labor
1971	Fall Semester	Fourth academic year opens with 3,448 students
1971	Fall Semester	Following excellent response to the summer day care program, the service is extended for Fall Semester; Center is staffed by a director with student and community volunteers
1971	September	"Educational Opportunity Program" is initiated to support students with weak basic skills in reading, communication, and mathematics
1972	January	"Operation ROAD" (Retiree Opportunity for Action and Development) project established; project allows senior citizens to take courses tuition-free

1972	March	College fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools after just 3-1/2 years in operation
1972	June	Third annual Commencement with 219 associate's degrees and 6 certificates awarded
1972	August	College assumes responsibility for the Regional Police Academy previously operated by the City of Kalamazoo

1973		Need for physical plant operations space is met with addition of 7,200-square-foot Garage and Maintenance Building
1973		Faculty member Sue Schoolmaster petitions Board of Trustees to offer women's sports; women's volleyball added 1974, basketball 1975, softball 1976 (Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 prohibits gender discrimination in any educational program)
1973	January	College launches TV series entitled "Close-Up" on Fetzer Cablevision; series promotes KVCC and discusses topics of general interest
1973	January	American Association of School Administrators and the American Institute of Architects praise campus design
1973	February	Kalamazoo Concert Band moves to KVCC's auditorium from Chenery Auditorium
1973	May 20	Spring Open House held for the public

1973	Spring	10,000-square-foot addition to Redwood Hall is completed
1973	June	Fourth annual Commencement awards associate's degrees and certificates to 256 students
1973	Fall	Semester opens with 4,232 students enrolled
1973	Fall	Community Outreach office is established at the Alma Powell Library in Kalamazoo; office provides counseling and information regarding KVCC's programs
1973	September	First basketball clinic features speakers Bobby Knight and Tex Winter
1973	September	Kalamazoo Garden Council presents KVCC's courtyard an award for gardening and landscaping
1973	September	"Hands On," a 10-minute film highlighting KVCC's vocational/technical programs, is produced by College staff
1973	December	First graduating class of KVCC's Regional Police Academy includes 31 officers from 5 counties (alternate source gives a date of 12/12/1972)
1973	December	College awarded first major grant: \$820,000 Advanced Institutional Development Grant from the U. S. Office of Education
1974	March	In cooperation with KVCC's Placement Office, the Michigan Employment Security Commission establishes its first full- time satellite office on a college campus; MESC's "Job Shop" places 40-50 KVCC students per month during the school year and 10-15 per month during the summer
1974	April - May	A mobile admissions trailer stocked with brochures and catalogs about KVCC's programs and activities makes day- long stops in the parking lots of area Harding's Supermarkets (Allegan, Otsego, Bangor, and Paw Paw)
1974	June	KVCC's Office of Community Development offers a 3-week Automobile Mechanic Class for women only
1974	Summer Session	College offers study trips to Europe and East Africa
1974	Summer Session	Instructors Paul Millikan (History) and Phil Wilson (Physical Education) offer the first bicycle trip for KVCC credit; touring around the state, the course is titled "History of Michigan;" more bicycle trip courses are offered in following years
1974	Summer Session	Equipment and 10-speed bicycles are furnished by the College for participants in the 2-week course "Bicycle Trip to Beaver Island;" (alternative source gives the trip and course title as "History of Michigan")
1974	August 1	Marilyn Schlack joins the KVCC staff as Dean of General Studies and Public Service

1974	Fall	4,935 students enroll for Fall Semester, a 17 per cent increase over 1973; College now offers more than 50 vocational-technical programs
1974	Fall	College abandons 3-week College Approved Program (CAP) format and moves to traditional academic calendar of two 16-week semesters
1974	September	Millwright apprenticeship program developed in conjunction with Millwright Local AFL-CIO
1974	December	First Career Fair, with more than 40 employers, agencies, and post-secondary schools, attracts over 2,000 high school students

1975	March 20	Michigan National Guard presents KVCC a plaque recognizing the College's efforts in developing a unique cooperative education program
1975	Summer	KVCC offers its first Summer Youth Day Camp for children ages 4-10
1975	September 22	Voters turn down an increased mill tax levy to support the College
1975	Fall Semester	In cooperation with Kal Aero of Kalamazoo, KVCC offers occupational aviation education for the first time
1975	Fall Semester	KVCC offers its first telecourse, "Classic Theatre: The Humanities in Drama," featuring 13 plays selected from classic literature and performed by London's premier theater companies; students read the plays and view them on WGVC or Fetzer Cablevision television
1976	Мау	KVCC hosts more than 50 leaders from small colleges across the country in a meeting to discuss how smaller computers can be used in many instructional as well as administrative tasks and roles; IBM speaker Lawrence Willey notes that while the effectiveness of computer-delivered instruction has yet to be demonstrated conclusively, some instructional applications are proving to be effective
1976	June 1	Tuition rates per semester hour rise from \$10 to \$15 for district residents, from \$20 to \$30 for Michigan out-of- district residents, and from \$30 to \$45 for non-residents; no laboratory or student activity fees are assessed
1976	July	KVCC receives 10-year accreditation from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools

1977	February 7	Valley News, a publication for students, reports that a student "lost a trench coat left in the building during the fire"
1977	July	U. S. Office of Education selects KVCC to conduct a national consortium of over 40 community colleges to increase institutions' fundraising potential
1977	Fall Semester	Tenth Fall Semester begins with 6,157 students enrolled
1977	September	New Financial Aid and Job Placement Center opens in room 3013, also known as the "playpen" area
1977	September	SAGA Food Service establishes the College's first meal service
1977	October	In cooperation with the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems, KVCC completes a comprehensive community impact study, providing information for planning and evaluation
1978	Winter Semester	LRC (Learning Resources Center, or Library) institutes a policy that faculty and staff get priority access to the copy machine during the first 15 minutes of every hour; LRC reminds students that if staff got their own copier, the 5 cents per-page price would rise due to lower usage overall

2010	June 28	Presidents of KVCC, Kalamazoo College, and Western Michigan University jointly announce a feasibility study for establishing a "higher education center" as part of the Arcadia Commons West (ACW) initiative in downtown Kalamazoo; ACW's other proposed educational and economic-development elements include job creation, housing, neighborhood improvements, retail and commercial growth, parking and transportation, urban gardens and a food-producing cooperative, enhancement of Kalamazoo's art community, and entertainment
2010	June 30	Children's Campus ceases operation due to declining enrollment and lack of vendor interest in operating the facility
2010	July	Kalamazoo Valley Museum receives a bequest amounting to \$1.79-million from the estate of an anonymous Kalamazoo couple
2010	August 5	Renovation of 4 existing teaching areas into 3 labs for physics, chemistry, and geology is complete
2010	Fall Semester	With 2 full-time and 4 part-time sworn officers, KVCC begins the first full school year with its own police department

2010	Fall Semester	ExpressWays, a 3-year program funded by a \$300,000 grant from the Kalamazoo Community Foundation, is established in Anna Whitten Hall; ExpressWays offers personalized learning opportunities for adult students who are academically or otherwise under-prepared for college work
2010	September	Phyllis Seabolt and Betty Floyd, friends of the late Mary M. Spradling, donate \$25,000 to support the Mary Mace Spradling African-American Book Collection housed in the Arcadia Commons Campus Library
2010	October	KVCC creates the position of Energy Education Specialist and hires Ted Forester to lead the way in reducing the institution's carbon footprint; "green" initiatives include controlling heating and cooling costs, recycling, a "green rooftop," a working wind turbine, landscaping with native plants, and others
2010	October 22	The new wing of the Texas Township Campus main building housing the Student Success Center, Office of Admissions, Registration and Records, Office of Financial Aid, Office of Institutional Research, and Central Receiving is ready for occupancy; structure includes a "green roof" with plants to filter rainwater, reduce runoff, and lower heating and cooling costs
2010	December	Athletic Director and men's basketball coach Dick Shilts announces his upcoming retirement after 32 years at KVCC
2011	January 18	Dedication ceremony for the 100-foot training tower for wind technicians; tower is located next to M-TEC on the Groves Campus
2011	February	Thelma and Rexford Hall make the largest donation to the College in KVCC history; the unrestricted \$383,000 gift will be used to endow student scholarships
2011	April - June	Center for New Media hosts its first Artist in Residence, painter Doet Boersma of the Netherlands
2011	May	Electronic employee newsletter Insight replaces the online newsletter The Digest
2011	May	KVCC's first-ever alumni relations program, Kalamazoo Valley Alumni+, launches (alternate source gives start date as October 2011 and name as KVCC+; a third source gives name as Kalamazoo Valley Community College Alumni+)
2011	Summer	Online reporting replaces paper reports of work hours and leave time used; full-time staff still submit leave <i>requests</i> on paper, and work/study students continue to use paper reporting
2011	July	New food service provider Aramark opens The Cougar Café at the Texas Township Campus
2011	August	KVCC Libraries subscribe and provide access to over 75,000 academic electronic books from "ebrary"
2011	Fall Semester	Fall Semester tuition increases \$3 (to \$79.50) per credit hour for in-district students, \$6 (to \$132) for out-of-district students, and \$10 (to \$180) for out-of-state students; a \$25 per semester enrollment fee will also be charged to all students enrolled for credit

2011	October 12	KVCC and Western Michigan University sign a "reverse transfer" agreement; transfer students who earned at least 45 credits at KVCC can apply for a retroactive associate's degree using credits earned at WMU; 60 credits are required to earn a KVCC associate's degree
2011	October	Through conservation efforts KVCC saved \$429,476 in energy costs over the last 12 months
2011	October	Kalamazoo Valley Alumni Relations Program, the first alumni relations program in the school's history, is established; program is titled "KVCC+" (alternate source gives start date as May 2011 and name as Kalamazoo Valley Alumni+; a third source gives name as Kalamazoo Valley Community College Alumni+)
2011	Fall	Alumni Relations program produces the first issue of <i>Kalamazoo Valley Community College Alumni+ Newsletter</i> , to be published once each semester
2011	December 12	A small group of former and current administrators meets to help identify unlabeled historic photographs in the KVCC Archives
2012	January	College announces energy savings of \$1,096,456 since 2010 through efforts to reduce electricity, natural gas, and water consumption
2012	January	Funded by a Michigan Department of Environmental Quality grant, a water filtration system to treat storm water runoff is being installed; projections include annual treatment of 18.2 million gallons of storm water and reduction of phosphorus, nitrogen, and sediment; project includes creation of 3 landscaped water basins (ponds) on the Texas Township Campus
2012	January	Text message alerts are now automatically sent to all students who have listed a cell phone number with the College; text alerts include KVCC closings (e.g., snow days), class cancellations, and emergency situations; previously, one had to subscribe to the text message alert system
2012	January	Kalamazoo Valley Museum's magazine, Museology, is renamed MuseON
2012	March 2	First-ever Alumni+ Art Show opens
2012	March 3	Women's basketball team wins the Michigan Community College Athletic Association championship
2012	April 13	Dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Utility Line Worker Academy training facility at M-TEC
2012	Spring	Two electric vehicle charging stations are installed near the wind turbine; stations are 2 of 35 in the Kalamazoo area
2012	May	Part-time Nursing program offered in Allegan graduates its final cohort of students

2012	May 7	Utility Line Worker Academy launches; the 26-week program prepares students to install and service electrical power lines; the \$12,500 tuition of the 15 enrolled students is paid by an award to KVCC from Kalamazoo-St. Joseph Michigan WORKS!
2012	May 24	Part-time instructors vote to form a bargaining unit with the American Federation of Teachers
2012	May 29	4-1/2 week Production Technician Academy begins; area manufacturers and others contribute \$56,800 to provide scholarships for the Academy, which aims to provide qualified production workers to fill local manufacturing jobs
2012	June	KVCC's M-TEC (Michigan Technical Education Center) is renamed the Kalamazoo Valley Groves Center; the Center currently houses Utility Line Worker, Wind Turbine, Police, Patient Care, Manufacturing, Mechatronics (later delayed to January 2013), and Hospitality Academies as well as the Michigan High Throughput Screening Center and several start-up companies
2012	June	College welcomes a Veteran's Outreach Coordinator for the Veteran Affairs' "VetSuccess on Campus" program; VetSuccess works to support and assist veterans with job training and employment
2012	June	KVCC Libraries establish a continuous giveaway of books withdrawn from the Libraries' collections due to age or condition; for the first time, books not given away will be recycled instead of discarded
2012	June 12	Board of Trustees approves a \$56.4-million budget for the 2012-2013 fiscal year; Trustees also approve property tax rate of 2.8135 mills (no increase over 2011-2012), which will make up \$18.9-million of the budget; property tax revenue has been in decline since 2009 when the College collected \$24.2-million; Kalamazoo Valley Museum millage rate, which is tied to the College's rate, is set at 0.4046
2012	July 1	FOCUS (Future Outcomes Collaboration Using Strengths) Performance Management Process replaces annual evaluations
2012	Fall Semester	Per credit hour tuition increases by \$4 for all students; new rates are \$83.50 per credit hour for in-district students, \$136 for out-of-district students, and \$184 for out-of-state students
2012	August	KVCC receives silver Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification for the Student Services wing opened at the Texas Township Campus in Fall of 2010
2012	September	Ken Colby, Director of Security, resigns
2012	September	College announces closing of the Business Incubator in the Kalamazoo Valley Groves Center (formerly M-TEC); the Incubator was originally created to house former Pfizer scientists pursuing new ventures
2012	October 19	Dale B. Lake, KVCC's first president (1966-1982), passes away at his home in Winter Haven, Florida

2012	November	Board of Trustees appoints Richard Ives Director of Public Safety and Mark Sheffer Police Captain following the September resignation of Ken Colby
2012	November 9	First graduation from the Utility Line Worker Academy
2012	November 12	MLive news announces that KVCC now offers Machine Tool Operator, CNC (Computer Numerical Control) Operator, and Welding certificates of achievement; a certificate of achievement requires fewer courses than a regular certificate program
2012	December 9	Part-time KVCC instructors join with Western Michigan University graduate teaching assistants and part-time instructors to form an umbrella union, the West Michigan Federation of College Educators (WMFCE)
2012	December 16	70th Commencement exercises held in Western Michigan University's Miller Auditorium; approximately 680 degrees are awarded to Summer and Fall Semester graduates
2013	January	Google Indoor Maps implemented on all 3 campuses; using GPS (Global Positioning System) technology, the Indoor Maps application for android and iPhones provides navigation guidance within KVCC buildings
2013	April 1	20-week Mechatronic Systems Technician Academy launches; Academy prepares students with the knowledge and skills essential to perform troubleshooting, service, and repair on automated industrial systems; tuition is \$8,500
2013	April	Class Schedule Planner is now available online via the College website; when a student enters variables such as courses needed, work schedule, and family commitments, the program generates all possible course schedules
2013	April	In addition to publication in the 2013 volume of <i>Winning Essays</i> , student submissions for the English Department's annual essay contest are eligible for the newly established Ron Miazga Memorial Award for Descriptive Writing; Miazga taught at the College from 1986 until retirement in 2007
2013	April 28	71st Commencement held in Western Michigan University's Read Fieldhouse; Miller Auditorium is unavailable due to performances of the musical <i>Wicked</i>
2013	June	KVCC Campus Band, established and led by Director and music instructor Chris Garrett, celebrates its 10th anniversary; band members include KVCC students, Western Michigan University students, homeschooled students, and community members
2013	June 30	V. P. for Academic Services Bruce Kocher retires after 46 years of KVCC service; hired in 1967, Kocher was the second personfollowing President Dale Lakehired when the College was formed

2013	July 1	V. P. for College and Student Relations Mike Collins is appointed Executive V. P. for Instructional and Student Support Services; Associate V. P. for Academic Services Dennis Bertch is promoted to V. P. for Academic Services; V. P. for Information Technology Terry Hutchins is appointed V. P. for Information Technologies and Administrative Services
