

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES – Associate of Applied Science Degree Program

The paramedic is an Allied Health professional and the highest level of licensure attainable for practice in the prehospital setting. Before learning the invasive skills of a paramedic, you must remain proficient in all of the skills acquired at the EMT level of training, which is why EMT remains a prerequisite for Paramedic education. What sets paramedic education apart is the complex level of knowledge and depth of understanding required to make decisions regarding invasive treatments, electrical therapies and pharmacological interventions for the acutely ill and critically injured patient. The paramedic scope of practice, with its complex invasive therapies and pharmacology demands acquiring and maintaining skill proficiency with high risk and low frequency procedures. Examples of frequently performed complex skills include venous access and medication administration and the acquiring and interpretation of diagnostic EKG's. High risk, low frequency procedures include electrical therapies such as transcutaneous pacing and cardioversion, endotracheal intubation, needle thoracotomy and surgical cricothyrotomy. The paramedic serves as the team leader and is responsible for determining the patient's condition and acuity, directing the actions of the team to ensure standard of care and reduce morbidity and mortality, and allocating medical resources including assigning personnel with respect to their scopes of practice. The complexity of skill and depth of knowledge required to function as a Paramedic and the risk to the patient if skills are improperly or inappropriately performed, necessitates an adequate background knowledge in basic and applied sciences and a formal medical education. Graduation from a CoAEMSP accredited EMS education program is a requirement for NREMT exam eligibility and subsequent Paramedic licensure

The Paramedic program is a comprehensive program based on the U.S. Department of Transportation's EMT-Paramedic National Education Standards. The program is designed to prepare the student for the challenges of Emergency Health Care. Combining quality instruction and real-world experience, the Paramedic program is quickly earning a reputation as one of the finest EMS training programs in the State of Michigan. First-time pass rates on the National Registry of EMTs exam are higher than both the national and state averages.

KVCC's Paramedic program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) upon the recommendation of the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions (CoAEMSP)

The Emergency Medical Services Associates of Applied Science Degree Program is a four and a half semester (two year) Associate Degree program beginning each FALL semester. A total of 24 students can be accepted into each program. The courses must be completed sequentially to be eligible to take the National Registry exam for Paramedic. <u>Classes</u> <u>meet two days per week on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There are two, 2-hour lectures and an afternoon lab each day</u>. Students are required to complete a minimum number of skills and patient encounters during their clinical experience. <u>Students are scheduled for approximately 600 clinical hours</u>. Clinical rotations will be scheduled with area ambulance services, hospitals and fire departments.



Online applications are accepted April 1 – 15 each year for entrance into the fall program.

Getting Started

- If a new KVCC student, first submit the online general application for admission to Kalamazoo Valley 1. Community College (www.kvcc.edu) listing "Emergency Medical Services, AAS" as program choice. If a current KVCC student, change program choice status to "Emergency Medical Services, AAS" by contacting a counselor or advisor at 269-488-4040.
- 2. Provide the Admissions & Records Office with all official college and/or high school transcripts, if applicable.
- Past and current students must have an overall KVCC grade point average of 2.0 or greater in all subjects. 3.
- 4. Schedule an appointment with a counselor or advisor at <u>269-488-4040</u> to develop a course plan. This is a critical step in the admission process!
- 5. Applicants must provide proof of current American Heart Association BLS Provider CPR certification from an authorized training center for the American Heart Association.
 - WPE 112 Safety & First Aid can be completed at KVCC to meet this requirement. Please note American Red Cross CPR certification of any kind is **NOT** accepted.

Complete the required prerequisite requirements by:

- Taking and completing KVCC courses successfully.
- Using transfer courses from other colleges when equivalent to the courses listed below.
- Having all prerequisites successfully completed by the end of the WINTER semester of application to the Emergency Medical Services program. All science and math prerequisite courses must be completed within 7 years of the application deadline (BIO, CHM, HCR and MATH).

- Applicants must provide proof of current American Heart Association BLS Provider CPR certification from an authorized training center for the American Heart Association.
 - WPE 112 Safety & First Aid can be completed at KVCC to meet this requirement.

Please note that <u>American Red Cross</u> CPR certification is NOT acceptable.

Be 18 years of age to participate in clinical rotations.

- Submit all official college and/or high school transcripts (if applicable) to the Admissions, Registration & Records Office and verify transcript arrival. Confirm required prerequisite transfer credit is awarded.
- Schedule an appointment with a counselor or advisor at 269-488-4040 to develop a course plan. Meet with the Health Careers Admissions Coordinator (healthcareers@kvcc.edu) to review your application.
- Complete and submit the online Health Careers Application. Select Emergency Medical Services as program
- The <u>online application</u> will be available each year April 1-15 for entrance into the Fall (September) program.
- Students must have successfully completed all prerequisites with grades of 2.0 or higher by the endof the winter semester (typically end of April) to be eligible to apply in April.

NREMT Certification

Students must have current NREMT Certification or proof of eligibility to sit for the exam. Beginning Paramedic students are expected to pass National Registry (EMT-B) exams and obtain licensing from the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services <u>before the start of clinical courses</u>. (www.NREMT.org).

Advanced Placement

 Advanced placement is the process of obtaining credit for prior learning experiences. KVCC participates in the Michigan Transfer Agreement so that student may obtain transfer credit for courses taken at other institutions. KVCC will award credit for prior learning to individuals who wish to use their existing MFR, EMT, or Paramedic licensure, or NREMT registration, to obtain EMS course specific credits when pursuing the degree track. Students should check with the <u>Prior Learning Assessment Office</u> for determination of these credits. There is great variation between institutions across paramedic level coursework. This is especially true regarding the clinical experiences. KVCC cannot testify to course and clinical work performed elsewhere when declaring NREMT Portfolio or CoAEMSP required competencies and therefore does not recognize the advanced placement for EMS coursework from other institutions.

Acceptance

- Admission decisions are typically sent to your Kalamazoo Valley email address by June 15.
- The EMS, AAS program does not hold a waitlist. Applicants who are not admitted must reapply.
- Beginning with the April 2026 application period, students **must have a minimum prerequisite GPA of 2.5** or higher. Exceptions may be given on a case-by-case basis with the approval of the program director.

Kalamazoo Valley's Alternate List

- After the top 24 applicants have been determined, the next 10 highest applicants are designated as alternates in case an admitted student declines their seat. It is not uncommon for this to happen.
- Alternates who are not admitted into the program from the alternate list must reapply and will notreceive preferential ranking in the next cycle.

Ranking of Applicants

The college implemented a holistic admission system for entry into the Health Careers programs beginning with the April 2023 application. The revised admission system was developed to establish a more equitable process so admitted students will have the best chance of success in their Health Careers program.

Proof of Healthcare License or Non-Credit Training for Points

If you are interested in potentially earning admission points for healthcare experience, please be sure to submit all supporting documentation with your application. (Applicants can only receive points in one of these categories). Examples of supporting documentation include: A copy of your current healthcare license or credential, a copy of your transcript or diploma for degree(s) received, or a letter from your employer specifically detailing skills acquired through on-the-job training, current job tasks, etc. for PCA/CNA (non-credit) training.

• Please note that personal essays or letters of recommendation from employers, family, friends, colleagues cannot be factored into the admission score whatsoever.

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Associate or Bachelor Degree Points

• Students must have a current license/credential in a healthcare occupation that requires an Associate or Bachelor Degree to obtain the license/credential. Examples include: licensed respiratory therapist, dental hygienist, paramedic, registered dietician, etc.

Admission Scores

• Please note that the competitiveness of each application period varies based on the number and quality of applications received.

After Acceptance

- An acceptance packet full of important information will be sent to your KVCC email address. Please read this packet thoroughly and pay attention to all deadlines.
- Several items will be due prior to the start of class. Examples include, but are not limited to: Current American Heart Association BLS Provider level CPR certification, immunization information, physical exam, 2-step TB test and Live Scan criminal background check.
 - Please note that the Live Scan criminal background check and drug screen will both be done ON CAMPUS after you have been accepted into the program. Further details will be given at that time. The corresponding forms in the application packet must be filled out and signed at the timeof application as acknowledgment that these items will be successfully completed, if accepted.

- 6. Schedule an appointment with an academic counselor or advisor (Phone: 269.488.4040).

EMS AAS Application Requirements

- ALL prerequisite courses successfully completed, or will be by the end of the Winter semester for the April 1
 – 15 application period.
- 2. Apply using the <u>online application</u> between April 1–15. Answer the four Short Answer Questions about Experiences and Attributes.
- 3. Upload supporting documentation with the application for points in the Healthcare Experience category.
- 4. Proof of current American Heart Association BLS Provider CPR certification. A copy of the card, the eCard code or link must be included with the application.

Other Requirements

- 1. An acceptable Live Scan fingerprinting (criminal background check) will be required at a later date. Further information regarding the on-campus Live Scan will be given to you upon acceptance into the program.
- 2. A negative drug screen will be required. Further information regarding the on-campus drug screen will be given to you upon acceptance into the program.
- 3. Immunization information, current (within 1 year) physical exam, 2-step TB (or QuantiFERON Gold TB blood test or T-Spot Blood test) and any other clinical compliance items required will be due after acceptance. Please pay close attention to due dates as outlined in your acceptance letter.

- 2 pts non-credit training (i.e. CNA, PCA, CDA, MFR, Phlebotomy)
- 1 pt. non-formal experience (i.e. caregiver of family)
