In-text citations are the citations within your paper. All ideas from an outside source that are not common knowledge must be followed by proper citation in the body of your paper. This includes both direct quotes and paraphrases.

- Use these abbreviations for any information missing:

No place of publication or No publisher given: n.p. No date of publication: n.d. No pagination given: n. pag.

Basic Book Entry Format: Author's Last Name, First Name. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Year. Medium of Source.

Book with Two or More Authors:

Two or More Works by the Same Author:

NOTE: The name of the author will only appear in the first entry. In the rest of the entries by that author, three hyphens will replace the author's name.

Example:

King, Stephen. Dolores Claiborne. New York: Viking, 1993. Print.

A Work in an Anthology: Author of Story. "Title of Story." Title of Book. Name of Editor. Edition (if given). City of Publication: Publisher, Year. Page numbers of work. Medium of Source.

Poe, Edgar Allen. "The Black Cat." *Literature: Approaches to Fiction, Poetry, and Drama*. Ed. Robert DiYanni. New York: McGraw, 2004. 130-135. Print.

Encyclopedia and Reference Book: Author of Article (if given). "Article Title." *Title of Book*. City of Publication: Publisher, Year. Medium of Source.

Example:

Springer, Marlene. "Edith Newbold James Wharton." American Women Writers from Colonial Times to the Present. Ed. Lina Mainiero. 5 vols. New York: Frederick Ungar, 1982. Print.

Government Publication: Name of Government. Name of Agency. *Title of Publication*. City of Publication: Publisher, Year. Medium of Source.

Example:

Michigan State. Department of Consumer & Industry. *Unemployment Agency 1999 Annual Report*. Lansing: State of Michigan, 2000. Print.

Scholarly Journal Article: Author. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Volume Number. Issue Number (Year of Publication): Page(s). Medium of Source.

Example:

Barthelme, Frederick. "Architecture." Kansas Quarterly 13.3-4 (1981): 77-80. Print.

Magazine Article: Author. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Day Month Year: Page(s). Medium of Source. *Example:*

Saporito, Bill. "The e-Health Revolution." Time 27 June 2005: 55-57. Print.

Newspaper Article: Author. "Title of Article." Name of Newspaper [City] Day Month Year, edition: Page(s). Medium of Source.

Example:

Royse, David. "Dennis a Menace but not an Ivan." Kalamazoo Gazette 11 July 2005: A3. Print.

NOTE: If city name is included in title of newspaper or paper is nationally published, city name is not needed.

Personal Interview: Name of person interviewed. Kind of interview. Day(s) Month Year.

Example:

Lewis, Matt. Personal interview. 15 Mar. 2003

Film Recording: Title. Director. Distributor, Year of Release. Medium of Source (Such as Film, DVD, etc.). NOTE: Names of the writer, performers, and producer can also be included between title and distributor.

Example:

Chocolat. Dir. Lasse Hallstrom. Perf. Juliette Bioche and Johnny Depp. Miramax, 2000. Film.

Internet Sources

PLEASE NOTE: URL is now only used if material may be difficult to locate through a search. If URL is used, it is placed after Date of Access, enclosed in angle brackets, and followed by a period.

Work Cited Only on the Web (Nonperiodicals): Author. "Title of Work." Title of Web Site. Version or Edition Used. Publisher or Sponsor of Site, Day Month Year of Publication. Medium of Source. Day Month Year of Access. Example:

Quade, Alex. "Elite Team Rescues Troops behind Enemy Lines." CNN.com. Cable News Network, 19 Mar. 2007. Web. 15 May 2008.

NOTE: Italicize Title of Work if independent; use quotation marks if part of a larger work.

Work Cited On the Web with Print Publication Data: Follow print publication guidelines, e.g. Book or Magazine. In place of original medium of publication, add the following:

- 1. Title of database or Web site (italicized)
- 2. Medium of publication consulted (Web)
- 3. Date of access (day, month, and year)

Example (Based on a book. Your citation may vary according to the original print publication your work is based upon): Bierce, Ambrose. "Academy." The Devil's Dictionary. The Collected Works of Ambrose Bierce. Vol. 7. New York: Neale, 1911. N. pag. The Ambrose Bierce Project. Web. 15 May 2008.

Scholarly Journal Published Exclusively on the Web: Author(s). "Title of Article." Name of Periodical Volume Number. Issue Number (Year): Page Numbers. Medium of Source. Day Month Year of Access.

Example:

Shah, Parilah Mohd, and Fauziah Ahmad. "A Comparative Account of the Bilingual Education Programs in Malaysia and the United States." GEMA Online Journal of Language Studies 7.2 (2007): 63-77. Web. 5 June 2008.

Periodical Publications in an Online Database:

Follow requirements for the print publication; then add the following in place of original medium of publication (Your citation may vary according to the original print publication your work is based upon):

- 1. Title of database(italicized)
- 2. Medium of publication consulted (Web)
- Date of access (day, month, and year)

Author, "Title of Article." Name of Periodical Day Month Year: Page(s). Title of Database. Medium of Source. Day Month Year of Access.
